Q: Can I receive a citation for not properly maintaining my yard?

A: Yes, it is the responsibility of the property owner/tenant to ensure the growth of the grass on residential properties does not exceed 12 inches in height. The area included in this responsibility is from behind the street curb to the rear alley pavement or adjacent easement. - Wear a bicycle helmet on every ride. Check to see if your helmet should have a safety certification.
- Ride so drivers and cyclists can see you.
- Look both ways for oncoming vehicles before turning or crossing a street. Go only when it is clear.
- Watch out for potholes, cracks, rocks, wet leaves,

storm grates, railroad tracks or anything that could make you lose control of your bike.

- Make sure your bike fits your height, weight and age.
- Inflate tires properly.
- Check brakes before riding.
- Bikers should ride one behind another and with the flow of traffic.

School Traffic Safety

It's August, the beginning of a new school year, and the Mesquite Police Department wants to remind you to drive carefully and exercise extreme caution when nearing school zones.

You should always slow down around schools and residential areas, but during the school year you must obey reduced speed limits in posted school zones. The maximum allowable speed in Mesquite school zones is 20 miles per hour. If you are driving 20 miles per hour in your vehicle, you're actually traveling 30 feet per second. This means that if you take your eyes off the road, even for one or two seconds, you will have traveled 30 to 60 feet. It also takes this amount of time and distance to bring your vehicle to a complete stop. Furthermore, the higher your speed, the more time it takes to stop and the more chance you have of not being able to stop in time if a child walks in front of your vehicle.

One-fifth of all children 14 years of age and younger who die in motor vehicle crashes are pedestrians, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. These pedestrian fatalities are more likely to happen in the afternoon hours, when school is letting out.

The American Automobile Association's (AAA) School's Open — Drive Carefully campaign encourages motorists to stay alert in areas where children are present, paying special attention during the morning and afternoon hours while children are going to and from school. As part of the School's Open — Drive Carefully campaign, AAA Texas offers drivers tips to keep school children safe:

- Recent studies have shown that more than one-third of motorists in school zones or neighborhoods just "roll through" intersections with a stop sign. Slow down in or near school and residential areas, and be sure to come to a complete stop in all intersections.

- Drivers should look out for children who may dart out into the street near school zones, playgrounds, bus stops and in neighborhoods. School-age children can be especially vulnerable in areas with heavy traffic volume, parked vehicles on the street, higher posted speed limits and few pedestrian control devices. Look for clues such as crossing guards, bicycles and playgrounds, which indicate children could be in the area.

- Drive with your headlights on — even during the day — so children and other drivers can see you. Scan between parked cars and other objects for signs that children could dart into the road. Practice extra caution in adverse weather conditions.

- Always stop for school buses that are loading and unloading students. It is illegal for a motorist to drive by a school bus that has stopped to receive or discharge a student, if the bus has its lights flashing or a stop sign out. The driver may not proceed until the school bus resumes motion, the driver is signaled by the bus driver to proceed or the visual signal is no longer activated. (A driver on a highway with separate roadways is not required to stop for a school bus that is on a different roadway.)

How Do Pedestrian Signal?

The safest place to cross a busy street is at an intersection equipped with pedestrian signals. However, most people do not understand how a pedestrian signal functions.

There are three phases to a pedestrian signal. Normally when one arrives, one faces a solid "Don't Walk" symbol. This symbol means that it is not safe to step into the crosswalk. If a pedestrian wishes to cross when this symbol is showing, the pedestrian button on the signal pole needs to be pushed in order to activate the crossing sequence. The first phase that appears is the solid, white "Walk" symbol. As long as this symbol is visible, one may enter the crosswalk after double-checking to ensure that no cars are attempting to cross the pedestrian path. The "Walk" symbol will be visible for a minimum of four seconds, but normally seven seconds. The next phase to appear is the flashing "Don't Walk" symbol. If a pedestrian is already in the crosswalk, he/she may continue to walk at a normal pace. If one has not entered the crosswalk by the time the "Don't Walk" symbol begins to flash, do not start to cross. Once the solid "Don't Walk" symbol appears, the pedestrian still has four seconds to exit the intersection before cross traffic is given a green light.
