Fowler headlined the Friday evening concert series in the festival's inaugural year, and continues to pack in the fans at venues all over the state. His latest release, "Bring it On" – featuring the smash single, "Lone Line of Losers" – continues to gain momentum and exposure on country radio stations such as festival presenting radio sponsor 99.5 The Wolf.



The festival line-up also includes Saturday night and festival headliners Los Lonely Boys with their bluesy "Texican" rock-n-roll, guitar-slinger Johnny Cooper, southern country rockers No Justice and Bart Crow Band and country sweetheart Jolie Holliday. ## Recycling Nearly Doubles In Mesquite's Green Bin Pilot Program Neighborhoods

Recycling levels in neighborhoods chosen to receive free green recycling bins have produced a surprising result to Solid Waste workers. They've seen a near doubling in recycling.

During the last week of August, Mesquite Solid Waste Division workers distributed 10,000 bins to select neighborhoods in the city. The neighborhoods were chosen to represent several different cross sections of demographics.

Since then, those neighborhoods have been monitored to gauge the level of recycling, and the results in the first month of the pilot program reveal the amount of recyclable material from each of the pilot program neighborhoods has almost doubled.

Mesquite Solid Waste will continue to monitor the Pilot Program areas during the next several months to measure the continued level of participation, and will investigate funding options to expand the program if proven successful.



Mesquite bought the bins utilizing grant funds from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, and provided them for free to encourage citizens to take part in recycling.

## The "Green" Shopping Bag

Mesquite is promoting a new option to recycling – re-usable shopping bags.

On November 15, 500 cloth shopping bags were handed out during Mesquite Recycles Day at Poteet High School in the hopes they will give people a new option to getting paper or plastic.

Disposable bags have long-term ecological effects and consume a great amount of energy to create. Here are a few of the facts and figures:

- A plastic bag can take anywhere from 15 to 1,000 years to decompose.
- It takes more than 12



million barrels of oil to produce the amount of plastic bags the U.S. uses per year.

- Think paper bags are better? The U.S. cuts down 14 million trees each year to supply the demand for paper bags. The creation of one paper bag also requires water and uses 13% more energy than that needed to produce two plastic bags.

Re-usable shopping bags are available online or at many retailers, and can be bought for as little as \$1 per bag. Solid Waste workers hope you think of the re-usable option the next time you go to the grocery store.

## Mesquite Residents Alerted To Coyote Activity

Recent reports of increased coyote sightings in less populated areas of Mesquite are prompting the City to urge residents to take precautions in order to protect their pets.

City officials advise residents can help deter coyotes by placing their garbage out on the morning of their scheduled pick up day. Also, do not leave food out for dogs or cats overnight, and trim and clean shrubbery or areas near your home where coyotes may hide for cover.



Mesquite residents, especially those who live near creeks or wooded areas, are advised to keep their pets inside fences or in the house at night. Coyotes are generally active between sunset and sunrise, but those more acclimated to suburban neighborhoods may venture out in the early afternoon.

Coyotes are rarely aggressive towards people. Any resident observing a coyote attack on a small animal is advised to contact the Animal Services Division immediately at 972-216-6907.

## Cooking Grease Can Cost You

Now that winter's getting closer you will probably start moving your outdoor barbecuing to your indoor grill and, as you do, water quality engineers ask you to please remember to keep your leftover grease and food scraps out of the drain.

Proper disposal of your cooking oil and other greases and fats helps prevent a backup.

The best way to get rid of cooking grease is to pour it into a container and throw the grease away in the trash when the container is full. Following this simple process could save you hundreds of dollars, or more, in plumbing bills down the road.

Cooking oil and grease poured down drains can build up in pipes causing backups at your home, into streets and even into the storm drainage system.
