

**2020 State of the City**  
**Presented at the Mesquite Chamber of Commerce Banquet**  
**January 30, 2020**

I'd also be remiss if I didn't mention our city manager, Mr. Cliff Keheley.

Cliff and I first met about 24 years ago when I was a Planning and Zoning Commissioner and he was a liaison from the City Manager's Office. I believe to the commission.

When I was first elected to the council, our then City Manager Ted Barron must have been punishing Cliff, as he assigned Cliff to be my day to day contact. Poor Cliff then became the recipient of my daily e-mails of tasks I'd pass on from my neighborhood visits or the many citizen requests I'd receive. And bless his heart - I think all those e-mails have quadrupled since then.

But seriously, as city manager, Cliff has presided over major accomplishments and events. From many organizational changes to the restoration efforts of downtown, to large commercial and massive residential developments and a historic charter election that provided for a new electoral system and more.

He puts in many hours at night and on the weekends and is invested personally to serving the city - and our community. Please help me thank you Cliff and his team.

Before we look towards the new decade, let's take a moment to glance back briefly at 2019. Our community was recognized by so many others from around the state of Texas.

The Mesquite Library System was honored as one of the best systems in the state. Mesquite was again identified as a Scenic City. Downtown Mesquite and its volunteers were applauded for their efforts and our Mesquite Convention and Visitors Bureau staff continued to place Mesquite on the map as destination choice by many a variety of travelers. Including a great article on Mesquite in Texas Monthly.

All of you already know – the City of Mesquite is a compassionate organization. The work our city employees do with charities like the Mesquite Police Department's Santa Cop, the Mesquite Fire Department's Fill The Boot and many charitable causes and programs throughout the year is so inspiring!

Our city employees both raise money for many charities and personally give themselves. And, we could not do it alone – the community and business partners are there with us each step of the way. I am grateful to be associated with such fine people. I believe God honors such mercy and kindness.

Speaking of being grateful, I am so appreciative of all that is happening in Downtown Mesquite. Our Front Street Groundbreaking this past year was a historic occasion. This year we kicked off our "Hometown Holidays" program with a series of wonderful Christmas events. Throughout the year we had events that complimented the economic, historic, and arts of our Downtown Mesquite.

Another inspiring program in 2019 was the progress of our new Mesquite Veterans Memorial. I thank God for all the donors – large and small - to that important mission to honor our veterans and their families.

And, a big acknowledgement to Randy Lawson and his team of volunteers as well as city staff for keeping that dream alive! We had a groundbreaking in November, and we have plans to cut the ribbon this November in honor of Veterans Day. As a matter of fact - if there are military veterans in this room - please stand so that we may honor you tonight.

As we build projects like Downtown Mesquite and the Mesquite Veterans Memorial, we continue to build a stronger economy in Mesquite.

The City of Mesquite's partnership with MISD, Workforce Solutions, the Chamber and Eastfield College, on the Business Retention and Expansion program has been phenomenal. I am excited about the future of the BRE with all these partners - particularly with Eastfield College.

I was a student senator at Eastfield, wrote for the college paper there - and I am a strong believer that Eastfield is a true asset for Mesquite full of limitless possibilities.

Thanks to the BRE, the Chamber of Commerce and others - Mesquite had numerous ground breakings... and many, many ribbon cuttings....

According to our Economic Development Department, the total building permits for commercial and residential activity combined was \$291 million in 2019 - compared to \$161 million in 2018. And guess what – we are just getting started!

We've also seen tremendous growth in our Mesquite Metro Airport. Today, the Airport is home to more than 200 aircraft – of all kinds.

It is a soaring economic engine for Mesquite and nearby communities, responsible for an estimated \$22.7 million in total economic output and more than 280 jobs.

Speaking of economic development, that the city has recognized the importance of good, reliable customer service. So, your city council and management are working to build a top-notch customer service in all operations.

Our planning and economic development staff are working diligently towards executing permits more efficiently... with less bureaucratic red tape and no last-minute surprises. Essentially, our goal is that any business or developer will one day be able to work with only one city staffer who will help navigate them through every stage of the process. In the end, we can all see more ground

breakings and celebrate more ribbon cuttings. And, jobs, jobs, jobs for our people!

The city's Parks and Recreation Department continues to provide quality programming for all ages – host fun events that are inviting for all families. And, we just recently opened our new Kids Quest Playground. It's a beautiful facility to continue the excellence of the previous playground many volunteers in this community helped to build more than 25 years ago.

At all times, public safety was a constant focus. Now, we have a new fire station underway over on the west side of Mesquite. And, we set funds aside to provide more bunker gear to protect our firefighters from the health challenges that come with that public safety profession.

And, we have continued to hire and train new police officers at every opportunity. Our internal training program is a huge asset to our goal of getting more and more officers out on the streets.

Staying on the topic of public safety, the City Council, met this week to receive a new and more aggressive crime fighting plan from our Mesquite Police Department. One part of that plan is making sure that anyone who works a late-night shift at any 24-hour operation - are not just left to the terror of being robbed at gunpoint.

So, to build a Mesquite that will one day be the safest city in America - we will have our police department, our business community, and our citizens all working in collaboration together!

And if you were at or watching the council meeting Tuesday night--didn't our police department do an incredible job of presenting their new and aggressive crime fighting plan? Chief Cato and his team did a fantastic job! The entire City Council and I are incredibly proud of the men and women of the Mesquite Fire Department, the Mesquite Police Department and our Mesquite 911 Dispatchers. All of them keep us safe in our community.

Speaking of community, I was so proud to celebrate our 15th year of Addressing Mesquite Day! For a decade and half that program has helped so many families, senior citizens and more in Mesquite.

It is one of the most sustaining volunteer programs in North Texas of its kind – and we could not do it without the support of the business community.

Staying on the theme of community, I'd like to ask Councilmember Sherry Wisdom to come up and recognize some special community leaders.

As she makes her way up here, this year I wanted to honor a few folks in the community. These "Ladies of Leadership" have done such a tremendous job to make Mesquite a stronger community. To speak briefly about these individuals is our lady of leadership on the City Council, Ms. Wisdom.

Sherry Wisdom, District 1

Thank you Mayor. It is my honor and pleasure to recognize each of these women, who are true trailblazers in Mesquite.

Barbara Dunn: Barbara is a longtime community volunteer who has served many years in several capacities for the city and others. She did tremendous work as President of our Mesquite Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association.

Debbie Anderson: Debbie is also a longtime volunteer in our community. She currently serves as the Vice President of the Mesquite Heart Board to help build a healthier city. And she is the New President of the Mesquite Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association to help build a safer city. Also, she is helping to lead our citizens committee on the Census 2020 efforts to make sure everyone in Mesquite is counted.

Teresa Jackson: As the CEO of Sharing Life, Teresa and her team help thousands of people in need each year every year. And she is taking a on an additional leadership role to help our community partner with churches and volunteers to address our homeless issue.

Melissa Davis: Social media has played a major role in our community, and Melissa has been a part of that. As the founder of The Real Mesquite Facebook Page, she has helped the community with sharing information and keeping people engaged on issues.

Joyce Coolohan: She is our dear departed founder of South Mesquite D6 Facebook Page was so important in our community. She helped keep the lines of communication and conversation open on so many local issues.

Each of these women have contributed greatly to our community and we appreciate them very much! Please help us thank them.

Councilmember Kenny Green, a former general government employee - will present our General Government Employee of the Year Award.

Kenny Green, District 2

This employee is responsible for providing care for all types of animals in our community – regardless of their condition. This dedicated employee has aided the Mesquite Animal Shelter in improving its operations.

In August, the shelter achieved a milestone of a 90% live outcome rate for 24 consecutive months. This employee played a major role helping nearly 6,000 dogs, cats and other types of animals find their forever home. She is a true team player and provides superior service to the community.

It is my honor to present the 2019 General Government Employee of the Year Award to Animal Services Officer, Sydney Paige.

He pursues excellence and is an ambassador for Mesquite, no matter what his work assignment. This is reflected from his early years as a Detention Officer – to his promotion to a Patrol Officer working Mesquite streets - and his 19 years as a member of the Mesquite Tactical Team.

He is married with two children, is an Elder at LaPrada Drive Church of Christ - and is always eager to volunteer his time to Special Olympics.

This firefighter demonstrates a commitment in a leadership position and serves as a positive role model both on and off duty. He started his career with the city in 2000, has earned several promotions and has received four Life Saving Awards during his career.

Recently, he spearheaded the department's self-contained breathing apparatus replacement project of 80 S-C-B-As and more than 200 air cylinders. He has raised the level of confidence of our firefighters in the breathing equipment they use when going out on fire calls.

It is my honor to present the 2019 Fire Officer of the Year Award to Lt. David Ivie.

And, we will also focus on Mesquite becoming the most employed city in America.

While we are so blessed to live during this great economy - we still do not want to be comfortable. We must do everything and more to make sure that every person in Mesquite who is willing to work - has a job! When a person has a job - when he or she does something useful with their day - it can change their whole life and those around them. God honors hard work!

Additionally, we will also focus on Mesquite becoming the kindest city in America. When we as a community and a nation - can get better and better at how we treat one another. And practice kindness and civility in all we do - all the other challenges we face - will simply seem to be less daunting.

Mesquite must become a beacon of light to the rest of the world when it comes to being a kinder - and gentler community.

So tonight, we celebrate our business community - our entrepreneurs - those who invest in our community and who create a wealth of opportunity!

We must strive every day to provide what we called during my CiCi's years - "EXTREME AND WOW CUSTOMER SERVICE!"

Any non-Mesquite resident who comes into any of our businesses - should experience the friendliest staff who are focused on being a 100% at everything they do.

For those who would say, "Well, that's just not realistic in these times." I say, "We can, and we must absolutely create such an environment of extreme and wow service. And we can, if we provide the leadership, if we are willing to work hard, and if we are willing to be great!"

We must reverse what we too often see out there - of just doing what has to be done to get by - and go above and beyond in everything we do!

My childhood hero, Roger Staubach once said, "There are no traffic jams along the extra mile."

Mesquite - let all of us.... go that extra mile together into the next decade!

More than ever ladies and gentlemen - I BELIEVE IN MESQUITE! The state of our city - is strong and getting stronger! We have opportunities to take advantage of and challenges to overcome. We will do the hard work. We will have higher expectations.
